Few people have an opportunity to see the 3 books on Semantography. The author, in writing these books directly on to the wax stencil, worked his way along in applying his idea to every human field of endeavour, be it in science, industry, commerce, communication, education, etc. etc. He started every chapter as a new enquiry into a new problem. Every argument and counter argument which came into his mind had to be dealt with. Every meaning used in that special field was a challenge to the author to show that the few symbol elements of Semantography can do the job.

Consequently, these chapters grew and grew, until 3 heavy volumes were the result. It never occurred to the author to propose these 3 volumes, mimeographed as a manuscript, as a publishing proposal to any publisher. Instead, these 3 volumes are the result of the author's work in convincing himself first and then his contemporaries that the idea of Semantography is feasible.

As said before, few people have seen the 3 books. Most people who asked for information got some pamphlets and brochures, which showed a few symbols only. In many minds there might arise doubt as to whether Semantography is really providing a tool for expressing any word in any language. The casual reader may instead come to the conclusion that the author has shown only the symbolization of a few meanings which lend themselves to an easy symbolization. As to the most intricate meanings of politics, philosophy, education and the like, this seems to be a hopeless task.

Yet, the author has done just this. The following pages contain the Content of Chapters of the 3 Books on Semantography. Every chapter is introduced in a few explanatory lines. These lines should convince the reader that the author has taken his task seriously. The fact that over 700 pages (as large as these) containing over 500,00 words have been used, must convince him that the author has not taken his job lightly.
